What is Poverty?

- Poverty is a state of deprivation where people or communities lack access to resources & basic necessities needed to live a healthy & dignified life.
- Living in poverty means not being able to afford medical care or access to basics such as electricity, shelter, and food.
- Improper nutrition can cause stunting and wasting, permanently impacting children's development.
- Poverty in countries lacking access to clean water & sanitation leads to the spread of preventable diseases & unnecessary deaths especially children.
- Historically, poverty has been calculated based on a person's income and how much they can buy. Multidimensional measures consider holistic factors impacting people's quality of life.

Multidimensional Poverty

- Multidimensional poverty acknowledges that poverty isn't solely about income. Even if a person's income is above the poverty line, their family may still not have basic services such as electricity, access to clean water, sanitation, and education.
- The index considers 10 key indicators: nutrition, child mortality, years of schooling, school attendance, cooking fuel, sanitation, drinking water, electricity, housing, and assets.
- If a person is experiencing deprivation in three or more of these standards, they're considered multidimensionally poor.



Poverty Cycle

- Poverty can be a trap that is difficult to escape. Without opportunities, it can turn into a cycle that persists for generations.
- When families lack the means to send their children to school, their children struggle to earn an income as adults.
- Communities lacking access to clean water force women and children to spend hours gathering water daily, leaving little time for school or work.
- Lack of nearby medical facilities makes families lose income when they must take time off work to care for sick loved ones.
- Natural disasters and conflict can exacerbate this cycle, putting vulnerable communities at greater risk.



Global Poverty: Fast Facts

- 719 million people 9.2% of the world's population live on less than \$US2.15 a day.
- Children and youth account for 2/3 of the world's poor.
- Extreme poverty is largely concentrated in sub-Saharan Africa.
- 24% of the world's population, which equates to 1.9 billion people, live in fragile contexts, characterized by impoverished conditions.
- About 63% of people older than 15 who live in extreme poverty have no schooling or only some basic education.
- 1.2 billion people in 111 developing countries live in multidimensional poverty, accounting for 19% of the world's population.
- 593 million children are experiencing multidimensional poverty.

- Christian compassion reflects the heart of Jesus, who demonstrated compassion throughout His earthly ministry.




- Christian compassion is unique in that it is rooted in the character and actions of Jesus Christ. It is:
 - Rooted in Divine Love: It is an overflow of God's unconditional love for humanity (1 John 4:19). Christians are called to love others because God first loved us.
 - Self-Sacrificial: Following Jesus' example, compassion often involves personal sacrifice and a willingness to put others' needs above our own (John 15:13).
 - Empowered by the Holy Spirit: Christian compassion is not merely a human effort but is empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23). The Spirit enables believers to love and serve in ways that reflect Christ's love.
 - Holistic: Christian compassion addresses both physical and spiritual needs. It seeks to bring healing and wholeness.



- Matt 9:36-37 When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few"
- Luke 10:33-34 But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where he was, and when he saw him, he had compassion. He went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he set him on his own animal and brought him to an inn and took care of him.
- Colossians 3:12 Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience
- James 1:27 Religion that is pure and undefiled before God the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world.

Beyond Charity

- Understanding the four levels of engagement in transforming individuals & communities that determine how we get involved & the timeframes:
- Relief
 - Relief is a response to a crisis such as a tsunami, war, drought or famine. It is about meeting short-term unexpected needs. This can take months or years.
- Rehabilitation
 - Rehabilitation typically follows a relief situation. It focuses on returning people to the kind of life they had before the crisis. This tends to take years.
- Development
 - Development is about lifting an entire community out of poverty and addressing the core issues that give rise to poverty. This takes decades.
- Reform
 - Reform is about changing the cultural, political and economic systems that allow poverty to perpetuate. This can take generations.


The Oath for Compassionate Service

1) Never do for the poor what they have (or could have) the capacity to do for themselves.

2) Limit one-way giving to emergency situations.
3) Strive to empower the poor through employment, lending and investing, using grants sparingly to reinforce achievements.
4) Subordinate self-interests to the needs of those being served.

5) Listen closely to those you seek to help, especially to what is not being said – unspoken feelings may contain essential clues to effective service.

6) Above all, do no harm

Addressing Poverty

- Microfinance Initiatives: Microfinance institutions provide small loans to impoverished individuals, especially women, to start or expand small businesses. These loans empower people to become selfsufficient and break the cycle of poverty.
- Education Support Programmes: Education is a powerful tool for social mobility. Supporting underprivileged children with scholarships, school supplies, and mentorship can make a significant impact.
- Agriculture and Urban Farming: Effective agriculture, community gardens and urban farming projects promote food security. They allow people to grow fresh produce and share resources.




Addressing Poverty

- Healthcare Access: Lack of access to healthcare perpetuates poverty. Initiatives that provide medical services, preventive care, and health education are crucial.
- Vocational Training and Job Placement: Equipping individuals with practical skills and connecting them to employment opportunities can break the poverty cycle.


