


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A YEAR OF CALLING, IDENTITY AND MISSION

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The Upside-Down Kingdom: Biblical Mark 10:35-45

³⁵ And James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came up to him and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." ³⁶ And he said to them, "What do you want me to do for you?" ³⁷ And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." ³⁸ Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?"

⁴² And Jesus called them to him and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. ⁴³ But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴ and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

The Upside-Down Kingdom: Jesus as a Servant Leader

- Redefinition of Greatness The greatest in the kingdom is not one who commands authority but one who serves others.
- Challenge to Ambition for Status Greatness is rooted in humility and service.
- Sacrificial Leadership Jesus contrasts worldly rulers who "lord it over" others, with His followers who are called to serve.
- Servant as the Highest Role Jesus emphasises that those who aspire to be first must become "slave of all,"
- A Call to Countercultural Living The Upside-Down Kingdom calls followers to forgo personal glory in favour of elevating others, living in a way that reflects Christ's sacrificial love and humility.

The Upside-Down Kingdom: Biblical John 13:1-17

¹ Now before the Feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ² During supper, when the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, ³ Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going back to God, 4 rose from supper. He laid aside his outer garments, and taking a towel, tied it around his waist. 5 Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was wrapped around him.



The Upside-Down Kingdom: Biblical John 13:1-17

⁶ He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, do you wash my feet?" ⁷ Jesus answered him, "What I am doing you do not understand now, but afterward you will understand." 8 Peter said to him, "You shall never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "If I do not wash you, you have no share with me." 9 Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰ Jesus said to him, "The one who has bathed does not need to wash, except for his feet, but is completely clean. And you are clean, but not every one of you." 11 For he knew who was to betray him; that was why he said, "Not all of you are clean."



The Upside-Down Kingdom: Biblical John 13:1-17

¹² When he had washed their feet and put on his outer garments and resumed his place, he said to them, "Do you understand what I have done to you? 13 You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for so I am. ¹⁴ If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you. 16 Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. ¹⁷ If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them.

The Upside-Down Kingdom: Question

The Upside-Down Kingdom: The Servant Leader

- Love and Service Despite His authority, He focuses on serving them out of genuine love.
- The Role of Humility Jesus, fully aware of His divine authority, takes on the role of the lowest servant by washing feet.
- Reversal of Power Dynamics In a traditional hierarchy, where leaders demand service, Jesus inverts this by modelling servant leadership.
- **The Necessity of Humility** Jesus indicates to Peter the need for humility both in giving and receiving.
- A Model for Discipleship Jesus instructs His disciples to serve others as He has served them. He establishes servanthood as a core principle for His followers.

The Upside-Down Kingdom The Missionary as a Servant Leader

- The missionary is called to serve, not to dominate
- The missionary is to learn, not to impose
- The missionary earns respect of the people by serving



The Upside-Down Kingdom: The Servant Missionary – Hudson Taylor

- Hudson Taylor (1832-1905), one of the most influential Christian missionaries in history, remembered for his pioneering work in China.
- Contextualisation of the Gospel Taylor's cultural sensitivity and willingness to embrace local customs allowed him to communicate the gospel in ways that resonated with the Chinese people.
- Empowering Local Leaders He championed the empowerment and training of Chinese Christians, believing that a strong indigenous church would be the most effective long-term witness for Christ






The ideal distance between a boss and a subordinate is low. The best boss is a facilitator among equals. Organizational structures are flat. Communication often skips hierarchical lines.

Hierarchical

The ideal distance between a boss and a subordinate is high. The best boss is a strong director who leads from the front. Status is important. Organizational structures are multilayered and fixed. Communication follows set hierarchical lines.

The Upside-Down Kingdom: The Missionary as Servant Leader

- Humility and Love Not exalting myself, not seeking position, showing your love by appropriately
- Intimacy with and Faith in God Prayerfulness, real relationship with God as the source of joy.
- Acceptance of Diversity Jesus' disciples were a diverse group. Relax, people don't have to be like me.
- Pursuit of Unity we are one in Christ, regardless of culture, gender, education... All are welcome.
- Stewardship and Trustworthiness God owns everything, not me. We are stewards of what we have, not owners. When people trust you, your influence grows.












































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
